## **Directions for each quote:**

- 1. Identify the person who is being described in the quote.
- 2. Use the Visual Thesaurus to provide a brief definition or synonym for each vocabulary word as it used in the quote.
- 3. For each vocabulary word, decide whether Nick's word choice conveys an objective perspective or a judgment.
- 4. For words that convey a judgment, state whether the judgment is positive or negative.

The first row is filled in for you. In some cases there may be more than one appropriate answer.
